Burrow Hill

A few weeks ago, with a fine forecast, I took my camera and my dog for a walk over Burrow Hill, near Hopesay.



There was an iron age hill fort at the summit, built and occupied between 600BC and 500AD. Archaeologists consider this to be one of the finest example of a multivallate hill fort in the UK. Multivallate means two or more lines of concentric earthworks enclosing a central area. Remains of round houses, granaries, roads and hearths have been found within.
